RUSSIA PRESIDENT WANTS TO RESTART NUCLEAR ARMS CUTS TALKS
Putin ready to talk to Trump on Ukraine issue?

WASHINGTON: Russian President Vladimir Putin is ready for talks with US President Donald Trump regarding the Ukraine conflict but is waiting for signals from Washington. The Ukraine conflict has plunged relations between the two nuclear powers to their lowest levels since the Cold War, with Trump repeatedly promising to end the fighting with a "deal". He told reporters on Thursday he would meet Putin "immediately", and that Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelensky wanted to negotiate.

Kremlin scoffs at Trump's claim that drop in oil prices will help end Ukraine conflict

MOSCOW: The Kremlin insisted Friday that a settlement in Ukraine couldn't be facilitated by a drop in global oil prices as US President Donald Trump has suggested. Speaking by video from the White House to the annual World Economic Forum in Davos, Switzerland, Trump said on Thursday that the OPEC+ alliance of oil exporting countries shares responsibility for the nearly three-year conflict in Ukraine because it has kept oil prices too high. "If the price came down, the Russia-Ukraine war would end immediately," Trump said. Asked about Trump's comments, spokesperson Dmitry Peskov affirmed that the Ukrainian conflict was triggered by the West's refusal to take into account Russian security interests.

"The largest massive deportation operation in history is well underway. Promises made. Promises kept," she said. Leavitt said: "The Trump Administration arrested 538 illegal immigrant criminals including a suspected terrorist, four members of the Tren de Aragua gang, and several illegals convicted of sex crimes against minors."

Israel won't withdraw forces by from Lebanon by Sunday limit

JERUSALEM: Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu suggested Friday that Israel might not withdraw all of its forces from Lebanon by a deadline set in its ceasefire with Hezbollah. Under the deal reached in November, Israel is supposed to complete its withdrawal from the country by Sunday. Hezbollah militants are due to pull back to the north of the Litani River, and the Lebanese armed forces would patrol the buffer zone in southern Lebanon alongside UN peacekeepers. Netanyahu said in a statement that the ceasefire "is based on the understanding that the withdrawal process could possibly continue beyond the 60 days." The statement went on to say that the Lebanese government hasn't yet "fully enforced" the agreement, an apparent reference to the deployment of Lebanese troops.

Israel is to complete action by Sunday

TEL AVIV: The Hamas militant group has published the names of four hostages it says it will release on Saturday as part of the ceasefire in the Gaza Strip. There was no immediate confirmation of the names from Israel. Hamas released the names on Friday. The hostages are to be freed Saturday in exchange for the release of dozens of Palestinians imprisoned or detained by Israel. Relatives of hostages still being held by militants in Gaza called on Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu to ensure all remaining captives are freed, while also appealing to US President Donald Trump to continue pressing for their release. In the first phase of the ceasefire deal, 33 hostages are expected to be released gradually in return for hundreds of Palestinian prisoners held by Israel. The first three Israeli hostages were freed in exchange for 90 Palestinian prisoners on Sunday.

Americans will pay more: Trudeau to Trump over tariffs

TORONTO: Outgoing Canadian Prime Minister Justin Trudeau said Thursday American consumers will pay more whenever President Donald Trump decides to apply sweeping tariffs on Canadian products. Trump told reporters in the Oval Office Thursday that he still plans to tariff Canada and Mexico at 25% rates starting as soon as Feb. 1. Trump previously threatened to impose sweeping new tariffs on Mexico, Canada and China as soon as he took office but the tariffs weren't applied on day one. Trudeau said if Trump does go forward "whether it be back on Jan. 20th, on Feb. 1st or Feb. 15th as a Valentines Day present, or on April 1st or whenever" Canada will respond with retaliatory tariffs and "prices for American consumers on just about everything will go up." "We don't think he wants that," Trudeau told reporters in Ottawa. By targeting America's second largest trading partner after Mexico, Trump risks upending the markets for autos, lumber and oil — all of which could carry over quickly to consumers. The premier of oil-rich Alberta, Danielle Smith, said Americans in some states could pay more than a dollar per gallon more for gas if Trump puts the tariff on Canadian oil. Despite Trump's repeated claim that the US doesn't need Canada, nearly a quarter of the oil America consumes per day comes from Canada. America's northern neighbour also has 34 critical minerals and metals that the US is eager for and is also the largest foreign supplier of steel, aluminum and uranium. "The US should be working even more with Canada on our energy, on our critical minerals, on the goods they need to deliver the economic growth that Donald Trump has promised," Trudeau said. "That is our first choice. If they do move forward on tariffs we are ready to respond in a strong way but in a way... to figure out how to get them removed as soon as possible." Canada is looking at putting retaliatory tariffs on American orange juice, toilets and some steel products if Trump follows through with his threat. When Trump imposed higher tariffs during his first term in office, Canada announced billions of dollars in new duties in 2018 against the US in a tit-for-tat response to new taxes on Canadian steel and aluminum. "Everything is on the table," Trudeau said. "It would be bad for Canada, but it would also be bad for American consumers." Nearly 3.6 billion Canadian dollars (USD 2.7 billion) worth of goods and services cross the border each day. Canada is the top export destination for 36 US states. The US president told reporters at the White House earlier this week that, in his opinion, the amount ofentanyl coming through Canada and Mexico is "massive."

Britain to convince Trump not to impose trade tariffs

LONDON: The British government on Friday said it has an argument in favour of convincing US President Donald Trump not to impose tariffs on its trade with the UK. Business and Trade Secretary Jonathan Reynolds told the BBC that the United States did not have a trade deficit with the UK on manufactured goods, which would make tariffs unnecessary. "We've obviously got a services-based economy. The US does not have that deficit with us so if that's the logic of that position, I think we've got an argument to engage with," said Reynolds. Tariffs are a key part of Trump's economic agenda as he assumed office for a second term earlier this week. He not only sees them as a way of growing the US economy, protecting jobs and raising tax revenue but also as leverage to pursue other policies targeted at certain countries. He has indicated a tax on imports from China and has also threatened tariffs on Canada and Mexico. Tariffs, or higher taxes on imports to the US, would make it more expensive for companies to sell goods in the world's largest economy. However, Trump has since indicated that he "would rather not" impose tariffs, suggesting trade deals are on the table. The US President told global executives at the World Economic Forum (WEF) in Davos this week that they could either produce their goods in the US or face widespread tariffs worth hundreds of billions or even trillions of dollars. Reynolds, among the ministers who were in Davos to "spotlight UK's investment offer to global business leaders", met European Union Trade Commissioner Maros Sefcovic at the summit.
